

writer's note

Hey,

So...you were somehow conned into coming to this play, huh? Did you notice all the toilets on the stage? What's that about? What are you doing here? Can you get out of it? No. The doors are locked. You're stuck here.

All you can do is sit and inspect everyone else in the theatre. Who are these people? Why are they here? Are they all just relatives of the cast? Probably, for the most part. You can look at them or you can read on...some choice, huh? Oh boy.

Who writes a play about bathrooms anyway, right? Yeah, me. I guess I might as well give you a better explanation since you've read this far. So here it is. You can read it...or not.

I started writing this play in January 2002 as a project for a Rhetoric class at UAFS. I wanted to write something about my experience of becoming a mother (my 1st daughter was born in December 2001), and I wanted to be able to do something with my finished project. I've always enjoyed theatre and decided that a play was the best goal for me.

I chose bathrooms as the permanent sets simply because I wanted the sets to be permanent and further because I have always thought bathrooms are interesting places.

Most of the play is based at least loosely on truth from my life. I must say, however, that many things are exaggerated, and some things are completely added.

The cast consists of family members and close friends. We have rehearsed in my living room, at a hotel, at friends' houses, in my car, maybe even some of us...in a bathroom.

I hope you laugh tonight.
