Dwiggins), an older, dignified man called Jorgy, and NEWC President William Coles (Cliff Scott) powwow with Jorgenson's long-time secretary and



assistant, Bea Sullivan (Carole Rogers). They decide to meet with Garfinkle, but nothing is resolved. Bea, Jorgy and Coles seek legal advice from Bea's very successful lawyer daughter, Kate Sullivan (Tina Dale). The stakes are high as relationships and strategies become tangled in lust, lies, scandal and greed. Who will lose? Who will win? You will, if you mix laughs with tears, comedy with drama, good with bad, and romance with loneliness.
