It will open Sept. 5 and run through Sept. 14. The story was filmed as a movie starring Henry Fonda in 1957 and is viewed as a powerful classic.

Director Amanda Elkins-Hiatt chose

to change our pace, unafraid of an all male cast of 14. The action takes place in New York City on a hot and sweaty August day in the mid-1950s. A/C was still a baby in a cradle.

When the lights go up, the audience will hear the off-stage voice of the judge (Judge Jim Spears). He will be instructing the jury of the legal aspects of the charge of murder in the first degree. The guard (Chuck Howard) will usher into the sparse jury room the 12 men who are not named, only num-

# 12 Angry Men meant for now

Why direct 12 Angry Men? For several reasons—the first being my attraction to the social commentary of this story. It was written in the 1950s, but the themes continue to ring true for today. Can we as individuals put aside personal prejudices and/or selfish desires to consider the value of another human being? When I watch this story, I always wonder which juror I would be. For me, good theatre should cause some personal introspection, and in small ways, I can identify with each one. Thus my second reason—I wanted the challenge of creating this play to impact the audience, actors, and myself.

When I first submitted this for the 2012 season, it was not chosen. The concern was for the need of 12 men.

Would enough audition? There was never a doubt in my mind. I resubmitted for 2013 with the reassurance that plenty of men and talent would show. Auditions were a challenge. With an exceptional turn out, and plenty of new faces, I struggled to find the right mixture. This casted concoction of 12 men couldn't be more ideal. These men work hard; they let me push them, and are uniquely creating each of these jurors. It is my privilege to work with each of them. The biggest challenge we face is finding the softer, more humorous moments amidst volatile anger.

Talent abounds from cast to crew, and in hindsight, I'm glad it wasn't slated for the 2012 season. This show was meant for now.
