Cyrano de Bergerac...

THE MAN(1619-1655)

The real Cyrano de Bergerac was a 17th century Frenchman of distinction—a renowned swordsman, social satirist, literary critic, student of philosophy and story—teller. He also possessed a nose of redoubtable proportions.

Cyrano-Savinien-Hercule de Bergerac was born in 1619 in Paris to a family of quality; his father had come from Italy in the train of Catherine de Medici and stayed in France after being granted two chateaux in Gascony-Mauvières and Bergerac.

Cyrano was sent away at the age of six to study with a cure who beat him and instilled him with an understandable aversion to education. Young Cyrano had a companion in misery, one Henri Le Bret. The two became lifelong friends.

Cyrano left college at the age of 18 and he and Le Bret plunged into the considerable pleasures offered by Parisian society. They were described as "very dissipated men" who reveled in the swashbuckling life. It was an age when every Duke or Marquis had a retinue of followers who swarmed around their leader...wearing plumed hats, lace-trimmed velvet doublets with capedraped rapier stuck out behind like the tail of a cock. They would call each other out to fight to the death over a jostled elbow or a word spoken in jest. It was a time of short verses and long rapiers; of close shaves and unbridled sword play.

Cyrano soon joined the company of musketeers, under Carbon de Castel-Jaloux, where his friend Le Bret was already a member. M. de Bergerac was an expert swordsman and fought scores of duels. He often acted as second to his friends, so often, in fact, that in a letter he commented "It would be false to say that I am the first among men, for in the last month I swear I have been second to everybody."

Most of the incidents found in the play can be found in the life of the original Cyrano. He was extremely self-conscious about his nose and it was the cause of more than one duel. In his book, L'AUTRE MONDE, he wistfully envisioned a Utopia in which the greatest honors went to the men with the largest noses.


