ACT I

Stephen Sondheim began his professional career writing lyrics for Leonard Bernstein in 1956 for "West Side Story." This was followed by "Gypsy" in 1959 for which he wrote the lyrics to Jule Styne's music. "Forum" debuted in 1962 and "Anyone Can Whistle" in 1964. 1965 saw a collaboration with Richard Rodgers and "Do I Hear a Waltz?" In 1970, Sondheim triumphed on Broadway with "Company." This was followed in close succession by "Follies," "A Little Night Music," "Pacific Overtures," "Sweeny Todd," "Merrily we Roll Along," "Sunday in the Park with George," and "Into the Woods."

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
