

But this hard work pays off in spades when it's done right and the audience gets caught up in the action and enjoys this comical break from their daily routine.

lan Miller - Hands-down the thing I love about farce the most is the high energy level that the actors and characters have to portray. There's comedy in normal situations that seem to be hiking to a level that the characters feel is the most important thing in the world to them. Some common things that you see with a farce is usually quick witted dialogue really fast, talking door, slamming actions, and a lot of physical humor. That's why I really love this show because I'm actually doing something totally different, something I've never done. I'm doing a physical comedy piece; however, my character doesn't get to run at all. I'm actually doing the inverse of what I'm used to doing

like running around all crazy on stage. This time I'm moving as slow as a snail's pace, and that in itself is challenging because playing

somebody who is hurt all the time actually requires more muscle work than

what I'm used to.

John Hall - You always know you're going to have a good time with a farce. It's written with that beat by beat irony that drives laughs, and there's always an overwhelming energy driving the play forwards. George Mann - I love being able to exaggerate everything: Reactions, personalities, characteristics. Subtlety is is able to push it to the edge.
