Laughter and Tears On Tap in "A Southern Exposure" Opening March 31

Two years after the show was originally chosen and cast, *A Southern Exposure* will finally make its debut at Fort Smith Little Theatre. This hilarious and touching comedy/drama, written by Kelley Kingston-Barnhart, plays March 31 through April 9. Directed by Lora Rice, this production was originally scheduled for April 2020. Rehearsals were underway when the theatre made the difficult decision to shut down due to the pandemic. Fortunately, the talented cast members were available to take up their roles two years later.

Raised in Kentucky by her grandmother Hattie (Cindy Clark) and two eccentric aunts, Ida Mae (Nancy Blochberger) and Mattie (Mary Beth McAlvain), Callie (Lindsay Vickery) stuns her family by moving to New York to live with her new boyfriend. Her dreams are soon dashed, then just as her world starts to brighten, she is forced to return home where she and Hattie discover the fiercest kind of love.

The veteran cast is supported by an experienced crew with director Rice at the helm. Katie Wallace serves as the director's assistant, producer is Joe Graham, and Cliff Scott serves as the stage manager. Brad Nance is in charge of set construction, assisted by Gary Cameron. Jeremy Marston completed the lighting design while Joann Peterson serves as light technician. Jorgi Anderson, Jim Moody, and Sharla Cameron comprise the props team. Eric Krigbaum designed the sound while Mike Tickler serves as the sound technician. The crew is rounded out by specialty costume designer Hannah Marston, graphic designer Zack Valentine, make-up Ashleigh Mathews, and prompter Rebecca Crouch.

Director's Notes

This play came to me in a rather unconventional way. The women in this heartwarming, laugh-out-loud funny, and quirky (i.e. "Southern") story were inspired by the real life family of author Kelley Kingston-Barnhart. It just so happens that Kelley has a friend who lives here in the River Valley. This friend passed the script along to a volunteer at FSLT who then forwarded it on to potential directors, including me. I only had to read part of scene one before I was hooked and replied urgently, "I want first dibs on this one!"

We were off to a good start with production preparation for this show back in March 2020. Casting was done, set design was in progress, props were being gathered, blocking was in the works – then the world as we knew it shut down. Pandemic circumstances forced us to tear down our set, pack up our belongings, and store them away for the glorious day when the theatre could once again be filled with the sounds of laughter, lines, music, and power tools. Fortunately, my cast and crew were all able to pick right up where we left off and have worked hard to bring you a show that I believe will capture your heart.

This is a story about love, forgiveness, and letting go. The author wrote, "It does not reveal great truths about the human condition, but little truths about extraordinary women leading ordinary lives." I hope you enjoy it as much as we have enjoyed preparing it for you.

Performer Cindy Clark comments, "I first performed with FSLT at the old theatre on No. O Street, so I truly appreciate the history and consider it an honor to perform in this 75th year." Clark says she feels a special relationship to her character: "I had a wonderful relationship with my mother and grandmother, both now deceased. That helps me truly appreciate the bond between my character, Hattie, and her granddaughter, Callie. They squabble nonstop but truly love each other. I can often hear my mother's voice when reciting Hattie's lines, and sometimes it seems like Hattie and my mother were one and the same."

Mary Beth McAlvain is happy to return to another comic role at FSLT: "Before try-outs were held for *A Southern Exposure*, I had several people who had read the script tell me I should audition because the role of Mattie was perfect for me. It turns out that Mattie is sweet and kind, but has a touch of dementia and is frequently confused, so I'm not sure whether to be flattered or not!" [Mary Beth is not pictured here. Her appearance will remain a surprise.]

While Lindsay Vickery is the youngest actress in the show, she is a veteran of the FSLT stage. She says, "This is the first show I've participated in since COVID hit. This is also the first cast of only four people that I have been in, and I am loving the intimacy of being in such a small cast and sharing the stage with this group of older, experienced actresses."

Nancy Blochberger rounds out the cast as Ida Mae: "A Southern Exposure reminds me of Steel Magnolias, because both have good dialogue, strong women, and plenty of Southern comedy. My character is pretty

matter-of-fact, and she is rarely idle. She's always sewing, clipping coupons, making a grocery list, or running errands. Ida Mae is not shy with her opinions either. I think I can safely say that Ida Mae and I have a lot in common. Best of all, I love her lines - she has some real doozies."

Director Lora Rice is excited to bring the show to the FSLT stage at long last. "It's a heartwarming story and laugh-out-loud funny; that's my favorite kind of play to direct. It's about a family and their interactions, and it contains a range of emotions – laughter, heartbreak, anger, love, and forgiveness. Plus, the author of this play has informed us that she will be attending opening night. Now, that's pretty exciting!"

Assistant to the director, Katie Wallace, comments: "I really love FSLT and all the friends I have made here through the years, and of course I love watching the shows and working with my big sister, Lora. I would encourage others to participate if you enjoy live theatre like I do."

A Southern Exposure opens March 31 at 7:30 p.m. followed by additional evening shows April 1-2 and 6-9. A Sunday matinee is scheduled for 2 p.m. April 3. Tickets are \$20 for opening night and \$12 for all other performances. For Season Flex Pass patrons, seat selection will begin at 7:00 a.m. Saturday, March 19. Tickets will go on sale to the general public beginning 7:00 a.m. Thursday, March 24.
