# Modern Drama up Next at Fort Smith Little Theatre

Three geese in a flock. One flew east, one flew west, One flew over the cuckoo's nest. O-U-T spells OUT, Goose swoops down and plucks you out.

*One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Next* opens at FSLT on June 6, with director Summer Robinson at the helm. The 1963 Broadway play by Dale Wasserman is based on the 1962 novel by Ken Kesey. The 1975 film starring Jack Nicholson and Louise Fletcher is one of the most honored American films and is considered a modern classic.

John Hall heads the cast as charming petty criminal Randle P. McMurphy, who feigns mental illness so that he can avoid a prison sentence. Once admitted to Nurse Ratched's (Cindy Clark) ward, McMurphy realizes his mistake. As he learns to trust and like his fellow patients, he leads them in a rebellion against the sadistic nurse.

The patients include the quiet Native American, Chief Bromden (Gerald Morris); the well-educated head of the patient's council, Dale Harding (Charles Belt); and young, childlike Billy Bibbit (Hunter Seegers). Additional patients include Joe Graham as Scanlon, John J. Bishop as Cheswick, Jon Gustafson as Martini, John McCawley as Ruckly, along with Ron Watson and Reece Lee as other patients in the ward.

Staff and visitors are Eric Krigbaum as Aide Warren, Tyler Huntington as Aide Williams, Margie Barragan as Nurse Flynn, Cliff Scott as Dr. Spivey, Austin Nguyen as Aide Turkle, Carry Johnson and Tori Storm Buie as nurses, Victoria Walden as Candy Starr, and Emilee Dale as Sandra.

## One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest opens June 6

A stellar crew supports this talented cast: Jennifer Roller - producer, Kelsey Flippo - stage manager, Jacob Price - assistant stage manager, Audra Sargent - props, Janet Renwick - costumes, Jeremy Marston - lighting, Jacob Hiatt - sound, T.J. Dudley - tech, Will Paget - set, Aaron Ray – graphics, with casting assistance from Carole Rogers, Eric Wells, and Landon Satterfield.

Robinson is excited to take on the challenge of this well known drama: "I love to direct complex shows - be it a comedy, a drama, or a non-traditional one. I'm really connected to directing characters who have experienced unique life situations and thereby are interesting and unique individuals with great stories to tell. The intimacy of FSLT will bring everyone watching right into the thick of things, and have them immersed with the happenings of this particular mental asylum as if they are also a part of the story. So, I'm excited for the audience to connect with these characters who are all so very different and funny in their own ways."

This particular show features a number of volunteers who are relatively new to FSLT. Audra Sargent says, "To think that I only started at FSLT about six months ago seems unreal. I have met so many people and have had a blast while making friends for life that I would definitely recommend being involved at FSLT as a great hobby for those looking for one. (Just come down during auditions and sign-up to either work backstage or to audition for a part.)" The versatile John Hall is ready for the challenge of playing McMurphy. He says, "It is rather challenging to portray a hyper extrovert when I myself am rather the opposite. This show is very symbolic, and full of deep, pondering questions, while all at once being filled with a violent need for action. It is indeed very different from the norm for our audience. It's a deep drama and not a farce, so while there will be plenty of humor, this is not a show with a happy ending. The story makes us debate that just because a thing is a rule does not necessarily make it right, and such rules/ laws should be examined to expose the potential harm they may cause."

Veteran FSLT performer Cindy Clark is enjoying working with a number of new volunteers. "It is very unusual for me to be a part of a production where I am working with just one other person (Ron Watson) who remembers being involved with FSLT from the old theatre days of North O Street."

Clark is enjoying playing the villain. "Working in the field of nursing, I am glad to have bagged this role, but it is rather a challenge to portray a character who is as evil as the wicked Nurse Ratched. However I could not miss out on this classic, and the chance to be a part of it." Charles Belt is enjoying his second outing on the FSLT stage. "I love the movie, and the character Dale is such an interesting and complex one. The story is more metaphorical than the usual ones played here at FSLT. I am so thankful that I get to be a part of this show that focuses on the human mind, and to portray this amazing character. I hope that I can honor the complexities of this character and do it justice."

"The fact that FSLT is such a small theatre is of benefit to this production because it enhances the camaraderie of the cast onstage. On the other hand, I find it quite challenging to get the right rhythm for the stutter that my character is supposed to have – more importantly, I want to make sure that it feels realistic and not overblown in a comic manner."

Cuckoo's Nest plays at 7:30 p.m. June 6-8 and 12-15. A Sunday matinee is scheduled for 2 p.m. on June 9. Tickets are \$27 for the opening night gala and \$12 for all other performances. Tickets for Season Flex pass patrons go on sale at 7 a.m. Saturday May 25. Tickets go on sale to the general public beginning 7 a.m. Thursday May 30.
