~ William Wordsworth


Fall brings change, and FSLT will change this month from our summer-musical-comedy to a well-known romantic drama, *Splendor in the Grass*. William Inge was awarded an Oscar for his original screenplay that became a 1961 movie starring Natalie Wood and Warren Beatty. It was adapted for

the stage by F. Andrew Leslie. FSLT will offer performances from Sept. 18-28.

Director Jill Ledbetter is no stranger to FSLT – with plenty of backstage and onstage experience, she makes her directorial debut bringing to life a story she fell in love with as a teen. The setting is a small mid-western town in the late 1920s, where everybody knows everybody.

The story revolves around the physical desires, love, and heartbreak of two teens – no longer kids, and not yet adults – a high school beauty, Deanie (Victoria

Musicals are unique in that we may not remember a spoken quote from a play, but we can often remember and sing a few of the lyrics or hum the melody after seeing a musical only once.

And face it, there are many songs that when simply spoken don't have nearly the same emotional effect or sound downright corny. But put those same lines to music, and we accept it, and it works. That's because straight dialogue can only do so much. When music is added,

using musical tones that subtly convey the necessary mood, be it sad, happy, or fearful, and dialogue is heightened into lyrics, things can be expressed on stage, often in metaphor, that could never be expressed in mere words.

Musicals have a powerful draw. Each year our annual musical is sold out quickly, and for that we say "Thank You." In one evening, you will see a conscious melding of story lines, music, lyrics, dance, live performers, and costumes that you'll find nowhere else. The finished product seeming effortlessly executed.
