FSLT celebrates White Christmas



Director's Notes...

White Christmas, a gift for your holiday season

In the midst of World War II, in 1942, a movie burst onto the scene containing 12 of Irving Berlin's catchiest tunes of the day—*Holiday Inn*. The movie, although wellreceived, did something far more than merely entertain; it introduced into the fabric of American culture a song which remains a holiday must, even to this day. That song was *White Christmas*. Twelve years later, in 1954, another movie was made featuring Berlin's music—the first in Panoramic Vista Vision and centered wholly around this song.

There has never been a Christmastime in my waking memory when Bing Crosby, Danny Kaye, Vera-Ellen, and Rosemary Clooney didn't sing and dance me to the window to check for snowflakes. Mary Wickes' dry and acerbic role as the housekeeper also did much toward showing me the value and humor of properly placed and smartly executed sarcasm. Indeed, this movie is one of the things without which my celebration of the season is not complete, and I dare say that the same is true for many reading this.

Imagine my utter delight to discover that Broadway had done what Broadway so often doesit took a successful and timeless movie and turned it into a fully staged musical. Because the movie itself didn't contain guite enough music to sustain an entire Broadway show, the authors/ composers of this production "fluffed it out," but retained the original spirit by continuing to use only the music of Irving Berlin. Included in this musical expansion are the songs, "Blue Skies" and "I Love a Piano," to name but two.

We hope our production of *White Christmas* is just the thing to begin your 2013 Holiday Season with a bang, and to send it off in the merriest of directions!
